When Martin Luther was dealing with The Black Death Plague, he wrote these wise words.

"Therefore I shall ask God mercifully to protect us. Then I shall fumigate, help purify the air, administer medicine, and take it. I shall avoid places and persons where my presence is not needed in order not to become contaminated and thus perchance infect and pollute others,

and so cause their death as a result of my negligence. If God should wish to take me, he will surely find me and I have done what he has expected of me and so I am not responsible for either my own death or the death of others. If my neighbor needs me, however, I shall not avoid place or person but will go freely, as stated above. See, this is such a God-fearing faith because it is neither brash nor foolhardy and does not tempt God."


Words from Pastor Bard on March 18, 2020

As I am sure you are aware both Bryan and College Station have enacted a "**Declaration of Local State of Disaster**." Part of this declaration was a strong recommendation that gatherings, public or private, be limited to ten folks.

While the City of Bryan's statement wording is that this is a "recommendation," I have come to believe that we should follow it **by suspending worship, Bible class, and meetings for this first seven day period** [the initial period of the "State of Disaster"], if not longer.

Why do I believe this?

- **Harm.** It goes without saying that if one of our people worships, and contracts the virus from being with us, this would be counterproductive to our desire to love one another.
- Effectiveness. I do not believe holding worship services, etc. would be effective during this "State of Disaster," as I believe most Bethel folks will stay away even if our doors are open. Even if half of what is



reported is true, you have a sensible reason to avoid all public places, even congregational worship.

• Reputation. Right now Bethel Lutheran Church has an excellent reputation in the BCS community. Our preschool is the envy of everyone in town. Our building continues to generate gracious and complimentary remarks. Our Live Nativity is now "a thing" for dozens of families. And so on. If there is a

large scale outbreak in BCS, and if that were to be connected in any way to Bethel, I believe that it would damage our congregation's reputation, hurt our Preschool's image, and harm our ability to share Christ.

- Options. We do have options, ones which even five years ago would have not been available to us. Right now our Called staff is working on a "<u>full Bethel</u> experience on line" for as early as this Sunday morning.
- o Pastor Eden and I would lead a worship service with children's time and a full sermon,
- o Our DCE and Children's Ministry Coordinator would offer both a children's Sunday School class and a youth Sunday School class,
- o And one of our pastors would offer an adult Bible class.
- o All of this would be live streamed on Sunday morning.
- O As well, I am prepared to live stream our Lenten Wednesday noon service, so that folks can watch it anytime on Wednesday.

I believe I was wrong to speak so strongly about our church doors remaining open. Our Martin Luther and his pastors continued to minister during the Bubonic Plague, believing that they were under God's grace. I too firmly believe this, but perhaps there is much to be lost and only a little to be gained by pressing on and pretending that anxiety does not rule the day.

Remember our Lord's words, "Let not your hearts be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me!" Our Lord Jesus is our leader, and He will not abandon us, but will remain with us throughout whatever is yet to come.

Practical Wisdom from Bethel's own Dr. Heather Clark

On a personal level, much of what you can do is similar to what we would do (and have done) during the cold and flu season — wash your hands, cover your cough or sneeze, stay home if you are ill, and take care of yourself! For our congregation, here is a summary of what you can do and actions we are taking to help reduce the risk to our church family.

GET GOOD INFORMATION – I am encouraging us to rely on reputable sources for information such as:

Brazos County Health Department (http://www.brazoshealth.org)

Texas Department of State Health Services (https://dshs.texas.gov/)

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) (https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-nCoV/index.html)

Texas A&M University's response to COVID-19 (https://www.tamu.edu/coronavirus/index.html).

Also, we should be aware that there are malicious groups who are taking advantage of the fear related to COVID-19 by sending computer viruses and malware claiming to be important information related to the disease. Be vigilant. Don't trust emails from strangers.


BASIC PREVENTION SAVES LIVES – It sounds overly simple but, hand washing is one of the most effective things we can do to protect ourselves and one another from illness. However, hand washing is often skipped or done too quickly. Proper handwashing should last for 20 seconds; wash with soap and water (hot, warm, or cold) will do the job. How long is 20 seconds? Tip: Sing Happy Birthday twice! If you cannot wash your hands, use a hand sanitizer. Since we were little, we have been told to cover our mouths when we cough or sneeze. But, many of us learned to do that with our hands. The best way to prevent the spread of germs when you cough or sneeze is to do it into the crook of your elbow.

SHAKING HANDS – We recommend that we suspend hand shaking for a while. Please use a forearm bump instead. Surprisingly, hugging can be quite safe as long as the huggers turn their faces away from one another. So, if you are a hugger, that's good news for you! But remember, not everyone may be as comfortable with hugging during this time.

IF YOU ARE SICK, STAY HOME – If you are sick, your church family still loves you, but we don't want you here! Rest. Drink lots of fluids. Take care of yourself. As Pastor Bard reminded us, our worship services are available online at https://www.blcbcs.org/. [Simply scroll down the page and click on the 'Live Streaming' button.] Remember, the best way to contain and slow the spread of illnesses like COVID-19 is to put space between people. In a time of infectious outbreak, social distancing, people keeping about six feet between them, is a common practice. And again, if you are ill, stay home. Please tell us if you are sick so we can pray for you and help you if you need help.

FOR THOSE WHO TRAVELLED RECENTLY OR THINK THEY MAY HAVE BEEN EXPOSED –

This week was Spring Break for both Texas A&M and many area schools and often results in a lot of travel. So, be aware of the virus situation in areas where you or family members have traveled. If there is a chance you may be at risk for infection, **self-monitor** for possible infection watching for signs and symptoms. If you traveled to one of the high-risk areas or Level 1, 2, or 3 countries, you should **self-isolate** for 14 days. In either instance, it is important for you to contact your healthcare professional and relay this information.


